Showcasing our beautiful Health Science building and grounds, introducing local students and their teachers to our math faculty, and providing a positive math experience for these students will hopefully result in more math/science CWC students in the future! # **CWC Livestock Judging Team- Amanda Winchester**

The Livestock Judging team has been busy putting on events and recruiting. On March 29-30th, we hosted a 4-H and FFA livestock sale. We had 13 lambs, 15 hogs, and six goats that we sold to students for summer projects.





On April 4th, we hosted a 4-H and FFA livestock judging contest. The team had to bring in eight different classes, set up pens, and tear them down. We had to have different producers bring their livestock into the complex. We also had to go around the state to lease livestock for the event. We had 135 different students, ages ranging from 8-18 years old, compete from all across the state. This event would not have been possible without all the volunteers who helped run it.









On April 9-11th, the Livestock Judging team traveled with Keith Duren to the Wyoming State FFA convention. The college sponsored one night at the event and got to use the wonderful video that the marketing department put together last year to promote CWC. The team helped with the State Livestock Judging Contest, while Keith and Emily Hagerman ran the booth at the career expo at the convention. We had the opportunity to promote not only CWC livestock judging but also all of the programs at CWC.

#### CWC ART

Matt Flint, Professor of Art, completed his second master's degree this spring. Professor Flint's degree is a Master's in Literary Science in Art History from Fort Hays State University. For a culminating experience project, Professor Flint developed an extensive curriculum about Indigenous art, especially Northern Plains Ledger art, for K-12 teachers.

Professor of Art Matt Flint had a solo show of 12 new paintings in February at Gallery MAR in Park City, Utah.

The Professional Practices in Art class planned, collaborated, and installed an exhibition of their works in the Robert A. Peck Art Center in March. The students gave short artist talks about their processes, inspirations, and conceptual underpinnings of their artwork. Professor of Art Matt Flint developed the Professional Practices class to prepare students for an art career. Central Wyoming College is the only community college in Wyoming and one of the few nationwide with a Professional Practices class as part of its curriculum.

The Annual Student Art Show occurred in the Robert A. Peck Art Center in April and May. The juried show recognized the work of CWC students who took art classes
